The Environmental Division enforces State Sanitary and Environmental Codes, Massachusetts General Laws (housing, sewage disposal systems, restaurants, public pools, bathing beaches, rabies, etc.) and local regulations (wells, rubbish haulers, etc.).

The staff of this Division work directly with the Boards of Health they serve, and with the general public to insure public and environmental health concerns are addressed. Additionally the staff is available in the Town Hall of member communities and at the office in Ayer to assist the public with questions or concerns they may have.

# A Note from your Board of Health Director...

With the return of summer many of us will be spending more time outdoors taking advantage of a local swimming area or pool, sending our children to camp or taking the family camping. Your local Board of Health provides oversight of the owners and operators of facilities to insure these activities are being conducted in a safe manner. Public and Semi-Public pools and bathing beaches, recreational camps for children and family style camp grounds are required to obtain permits from the Board of Health for the operation of those facilities and these facilities are inspected and monitored by the Board of Health. A description of the Board of Health involvement in each activity is listed below.

Bathing Beaches Whether it is your town beach or a beach operated by an association for its member these beaches are monitored weekly, including bacteria testing, to address activities that may affect the quality of the beach waters and inform the public regarding the water safety. If testing indicates the water quality is unsafe (elevated bacteria levels), a beach will be closed until the bacteria testing reveals the levels are below the regulatory standard. Beach testing is conducted during the dates of operation for the beach.

<u>Pools</u> Swimming pools are inspected to insure the filtration and chlorination systems are functioning properly, the pool water is clear and the pool and necessary facilitates are safe and sanitary.

<u>Family Style Campground</u> If you vacation in a recreational vehicle (camper) or a tent you have likely stayed at a family style campground. These facilities are inspected by the Board of Health to insure the facilities, activities and services provided are done in a safe and sanitary manner.

Recreational camps for children Summer camp programs can provide wonderful experiences for children and there are no shortages of the programs available. All youth camps, programs that call themselves camp for youth and programs that meet the definition of a camp must be licensed and inspected by the Board of Health to insure they meet the camp regulations. These regulations are extensive addressing such areas as background checks and qualifications for staff, safety of the facilities and the program operated in those facilities and the provision for medical care at these facilities. If you are considering sending a child to camp don't hesitate to ask the operator if they are licensed.

#### **Prevent Recreational Water Illnesses (RWIs)!**

RWIs are caused by germs spread by swallowing, breathing in mists of ,or having contact with contaminated water. The most commonly reported RWI is diarrhea, caused by germs like Cryptosporidium ("Crypto"), Giardia, E. coli, Norovirus, and Shigella.

Just one diarrheal incident in the water can release millions of germs. If someone swallows a mouthful of the water, it can cause diarrhea lasting up to 3 weeks. Here are some tips swimmers should take to help protect themselves, their friends, and their family.

#### Check yourself! Keep the pee, poop, sweat, blood, and dirt out of the water.

- Don't swim or let your kids swim when sick with diarrhea.
- Stay out of the water if you have any open wound that is not covered with a waterproof bandage.
- Shower before you get in the water. Rinsing off for just 1 minute helps get rid of most stuff that might be on a swimmer's body.
- Don't swallow the water!

## Every hour—everyone out!

- Take kids on bathroom breaks.
- Check diapers, and change them in a bathroom or diaper-changing area—not poolside—to keep
  - germs away from the pool.
- Reapply sunscreen.
- Drink plenty of fluids.

Wash your hands
Clean all surfaces and utensils



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Use a fresh, clean plate for serving cooked food , Don't let raw meat juices touch other food



Cook to safe temp:


Beef, Pork, Lamb, Veal: 145 degrees F Ground meets: 160 degrees F Poultry: 165 degrees F Keep Hot foods HOT!



Discard any perishable food that has been sitting out more than 2 hours! (*I hour* in hot weather above 90 degrees)



Keep cold foods cold
Do NOT thaw frozen items at room temp
Marinate food in fridge
Use coolers & ice packs
Keep coolers in the shade
Keep cooler lid closed
If there is still ice in cooler when you get back
home, the food is safe to return to fridge.

# SHARPS CAN'T BE ACCEPTED AT TOWN HALLS or COUNCILS ON AGING FACILITIES

**SHARPS DISPOSAL** 

(The drop-off location is listed below)

In an attempt to provide an inexpensive method to properly dispose of syringes and lancets (Sharps) the Nashoba Associated Board of Health has established the following program for its 16 member communities.

#### Fees per container: \$5.00 (4 quart)

- 1. Sharps containers will be available for purchase at your local Town Hall and the Nashoba Associated Board of Health Office (purchase price covers the cost of disposal).
- 2. Sharps can only be accepted in approved containers; persons who bring loose sharps or sharps in unapproved containers (i.e. detergent bottle or coffee can) will be provided an approved container, as part of the disposal cost, and will need to transfer the sharps into that container before they can be accepted.
- 3. You will need to complete an informational label that gets affixed to the container prior to disposal to verify payment.
- 4. Listed below are companies that provide mail-back sharps disposal (this office does not endorse any of these companies; the information is provided for your convenience)
- 5. This program is <u>not</u> for the disposal of sharps from commercial operations.
